

God Will Use You

Many Christians seem to have an attitude that they have little or nothing to contribute to the Kingdom of God. Some look around the congregation and see how others are able to serve with a talent God has given them, but they do not see any such gift in themselves. While it is very true that we are to use the talents God has given us, sometimes God's use of us is very simple and basic. Visit the orphan and widow in their distress (James 1:27), sharing with someone who has need (Ephesians 4:28), to say some words of encouragement (1 Thessalonians 5:11; Titus 2:4; Hebrews 3:13). Sometimes we just look to hard for a special gift and forget the obvious ways in which God wants us to serve.

God often uses us for His purpose, and we will not know that. Consider the example of Joseph. After he was ruling in Egypt, when his brothers came to buy grain, Joseph said, "God sent me before you to preserve for you a remnant in the earth, and to keep you alive by a great deliverance... it was not you who sent me here, but God" (Genesis 45:7–8). God used a man who had been mistreated by his brothers and imprisoned unjustly to bring about the physical salvation of many people. Joseph was given a special gift of interpreting dreams and God blessed his efforts with success, but Joseph was not "trained" to be a national leader, he was not "trained" to be in charge of all of Potiphar's business dealings and staff. God was with him, but Joseph was faithful to God in all the situations in his life. God used Joseph.

The example of Joseph is unique. Consider another example that is very lowly and common. Dorcas (Tabitha) "was abounding with deeds of kindness and charity which she continually did" (Acts 9:36). When she died, all the widows were showing Peter "all the tunics and garments that Dorcas used to make while she was with them" (Acts 9:39). Granted, not everyone can sew well, but Tabitha did what she could for others and is remembered and held up in Scripture as a woman of faith. Peter prayed and God raised Dorcas from the dead and "it became known all over Joppa, and many believe in the Lord" (Acts 9:42). God used the faithful disciple Dorcas.

The Lord told Ananias that Saul "is a chosen instrument of Mine, to bear My name before the Gentiles and kings and the sons of Israel" (Acts 9:15). An instrument to be used. Paul later writes, "Then I went into the regions of Syria and Cilicia. I was still unknown by sight to the churches of Judea which are in Christ; but they only kept hearing, "The man who once persecuted us is now preaching the faith which he once tried to destroy". And they were glorifying God because of me" (Galatians 1:21-24). While Saul was a gifted man, he had also been a disbeliever. I am encouraged when I think there is not much I can do in serving God, and remember His use of Saul.

Mordecai told Esther, "who knows whether you have not attained royalty for such a time as this?" (Esther 4:14). She is remembered in Scripture for her faith, bravery, and doing great things for God's people. God used Esther.

"Therefore, if anyone cleanses himself from these things, he will be an implement for honor, sanctified, useful to the Master, prepared for every good work" (2 Timothy 2:21). When we have faith, we are prepared for God to use us, and He does use us. We must have the desire and willingness to be spent doing His work.

Consider 1 Peter 4:10–11. "As each one has received a special gift, employ it in serving one another as good stewards of the manifold grace of God. Whoever speaks, is to do so as one who is speaking the utterances of God; whoever serves is to do so as one who is serving by the strength which God supplies; so that in all things God may be glorified through Jesus Christ, to whom belongs the glory and dominion forever and ever. Amen."

Christians are useful to the Master. He gives us gifts and He supplies us with strength to serve. David "served the purpose of God in his own generation" (Acts 13:36), and we must serve God in our generation. Be faithful and "be prepared for every good work," useful to the Master.

As those who receive the blessings of this gift, are we as thankful as we ought to be? Have we come to a point in our life that we take the sacrifice of Christ for granted? May it never be! "Thanks be to God who always leads us in His triumph in Christ" (2 Cor. 2:14).
